2015/2016 - PE and Sport Premium Funding for Primary Schools

Total funding allocated for Great Crosby School from the start of the premium is £ 12890

Schools since September 2013 have been allocated extra funding for improving physical education. The emphasis is on the provision and expertise being sustainable in the school once the money has been withdrawn. The DFE have allocated this funding directly to primary headteachers and is based on the number of eligible pupils in the school. The funding was initially for two academic years but was extended for another academic year. Schools can choose how they use the funding but it must be based on a sustainability model.

The DFE are holding schools accountable by requiring them to publish each April, on their websites, details of how they spend (or will spend) their PE and sport grant. They must also include the impact the funding has on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment. This year the grant conditions and guidance emphasise that the funding must be used to enhance, rather than maintain, existing provision and that improvements must be sustainable in the long term.

At Great Crosby Primary School we aim to raise the profile of Sports and its provision.

Below are the details on how we at Great Crosby are spending this funding and the effect it has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment.
